Without doubt, there is anguish which on long term harasses people: no answer to the future, no perspective for a peaceful solution of this conflict. Anguish and lack of perspective grasps people; the past experience has showed us that insecurity can push one's to commit an irreversible disaster.

It is in this difficult and depressing context of insecurity and anxiety that we, on this lent, have prepared ourselves in order to welcome the Light, the Light of the Resurrection of our Lord. Unfortunately ,disturbed by the harsh daily life and the future which



seems to grow darker every day, too concerned about the little daily upsets, often we are inclined to forget that each spiritual development implies that progressively we have to let behind us our habits, our fears, our certainties, our attachments, our securities. Especially in this lent we have tried to struggle hard in order to find ways in which sometimes the feeling of losing everything, including ourselves, prevails over the consciousness to go to the fixed target, which is the certainty that through the Resurrection of our Lord there is a life in God behind death .

We are sure that having overcome all these hardships, while being always tuned in with the concerns of people, the message of Easter, will fulfill our hearts with hope in being confident to a life of bliss. We believe that faith will give us the knowledge of how to live the present peacefully. If we trust our Lord, our anguish will disappear and make place to a deep serenity. Let us pray for a peaceful solution of this conflict.
