As summer progresses and everyone thinks about taking a well-deserved rest, the hospital continues its mission of welcoming and caring for the women of the Bethlehem region.

For almost two years now, since the region has been at war, the hospital has noted a decline in births. This phenomenon can be explained by three factors:

- The difficulty of easily traveling for residents of the southern part of the governorate. Bethlehem is often only accessible through a single checkpoint.
- The sudden drop in the number of marriages since October 7, 2023.
- The overall impoverishment of the population, which lives mainly from religious tourism, which ended in October 2023.

However, while the situation remains worrying, a small glimmer of hope is appearing on the horizon. While until now, younger people were reluctant to get married out of respect for the suffering of the people of Gaza, we are now seeing a real upturn in marriages.

Let us wish the best to the newlyweds this summer and be ready to welcome the expectant mothers who will undoubtedly seek medical care or give birth at the Holy Family Hospital.

Let us be certain that the light of Bethlehem will never be extinguished.

### From a provider to a patient

Every so often a story unfolds within our walls that captures the spirit of the Holy Family Hospital, this month we had the honor of being a part of such story. Belonging to Raja Eshegerat one of our own Medical Trainees.

On 1st of May 2024 we were happy to welcome Raja to our team for her full year training, she quickly became a familiar and valued presence in our halls, known for her passion for learning and earning experiences.

Her journey into the medical world started with clear purpose in 2021, she was enrolled as a student at Al- Quds university, like many she felt the calling to serve, Raja started her training in the Red Crescent Society then she came to the Holy Family Hospital, she trained in the field of obstetrics and genecology, she began her training under the direct supervising of the Palestinian medical council. Dedicating herself to the profound work of caring for the mothers and bringing lives into the world.

On 21<sup>th</sup> of July she gave birth to a healthy baby boy at Holy Family Hospital and became a mother herself here in our hospital, surrounded by her colleagues and monitors who were guiding her professional journey.

# **Returning to Where Safety Begins**

On July 24, 2025, the Holy Family Hospital in Bethlehem welcomed baby Carlos at 1:30 a.m., weighing 3,490 grams. The baby was delivered in a professional and compassionate medical environment, chosen for the second time by his mother, Rosanna.

This wasn't the first time Rosanna and her husband, Fadi, had chosen Holy Family Hospital as the place to begin a new life. A few years earlier, Rosanna had given birth to her first child at the same hospital, and her experience, as she describes it, was more than just a birth; it was a journey filled with reassurance, care, and sincere nurturing.





With the beginning of her second pregnancy, Rosanna didn't hesitate to make the decision again. She returned to the place where she had found safety and support, to undergo a new birth accompanied by the same medical team, under the supervision of Dr. Saba.

#### Rosanna says:

From the moment of the first check-up until the moment of delivery, I felt I was in safe hands. The care was not just medical, but humane in every sense of the word. This place is not just a hospital, but a real family.

Rosanna's opinion was not alone; it was

also confirmed by her supervising physician, Dr. Saba, who spoke about the importance of

a relationship built on trust between the medical team and pregnant women. He added, "When a mother chooses to return to the same place to give birth again, this is the greatest testimony we can receive. We accompany mothers at a pivotal moment in their lives, striving to ensure that this moment is reassuring and safe in every respect."

Rosanna's experience with the hospital, both during follow-up and during delivery, reflects Holy Family Hospital's commitment to providing professional, yet warm, healthcare. Her choice to return was not a



coincidence; it was the result of trust built on real experience, and this is the story we are proud to tell.

# The unforgettable... is chosen again



The midwife's familiar face, her tone of voice, and her comforting manner all took Marah back to the moment of safety, the moment her first child was born in this very place.

"I know this feeling," Marah says, reassured that her choice was not merely a medical decision, but rather one stemming from an unforgettable experience. Marah and her husband, Anas, reiterated what they knew well: that the Holy Family Hospital is not just a place to give birth, but an environment that builds a true support network around the mother.

On July 24, 2025, Marah gave birth to her second child, Zain Al-Din, weighing 3,500 grams, in a birth she describes as calm, humane, and fearless.

The reason for her return was not simply a previous good birth, but, as she says, "Everything here is clear, organized, where anxiety find no place. I knew I would be treated with care and listened to. That is all a mother needs."

The follow-up period during pregnancy was more than a routine check-up; it included continuous communication, explanation and guidance sessions, and frequent reassuring touches. This is what made her second birth pass with confidence, even in the smallest details.

The midwives who accompanied her during the birth were not just a medical team. As she describes them, they were around me like a sister, supportive/ attentive, and extremely professional.

I knew I wasn't alone. Zain Al-Din 's birth experience didn't begin at the moment of labor. It began with the birth of her first child, when the initial trust was instilled. When people return to the same place.

at their fateful moments, this is no coincidence. Rather, it is an implicit recognition that care is not measured by the number of births, but by the quality of the relationship.



Every family's story has a defining chapter and for Stephanie and Elias. The four years between their two children was a bridge built on a foundation of trust.

### Between Two Children, Four Years of Trust



On July 11, 2025, the family welcomed their new baby, Issa, weighing 3,170 grams. This was a second birth filled with calm and confidence, under the care of the same medical team she had grown to trust years earlier and she was eager to return to them. Stephanie says with a grateful smile, "Four years have passed, and I still remember how safe I felt here during my first birth. I knew I would return, and that's what I did."

During her second pregnancy, follow-up visits were

more than just appointments. They were support sessions, preparation, and honest communication between the mother and the medical team.

The midwives added, "We don't just care for mothers; we accompany them, building a relationship that makes childbirth an anticipated, not a frightening, moment. This is what we always strive to make them feel."

The birth went smoothly, in an environment that paid attention to every detail, from the delivery room to the postpartum care.

Stephanie wasn't the only one who felt confident. Her husband, Elias, clearly stated this while holding their new-born: "My family is safe with you, and that's all I need."

The obstetrician who supervised the delivery expressed the importance of this mutual trust, saying: "When a family chooses to give birth with us for the second time, it means that their first experience was not only successful, but also humane. This is our true goal."

At every stage, from years ago to today, the decision was based on personal, authentic, and respectful experience.

Just as the first child was born in a reassuring atmosphere, Issa arrived to complete a family story that began years ago and continues to be written in the same place.



# A Visit of Gratitude from Taiwan, Memories That Last a Lifetime

The Holy Family Hospital was honored to welcome a group of visitors from Taiwan on July 23, 2025, who came to express their deep appreciation for the hospital's mission and its commitment to providing quality medical care to mothers and children from all around the world.

Among the group was Mrs. Huang Vera, who returned after more than two decades to say one heartfelt word: thank you.





Vera shared her personal story from 2002, when she was living in Bethlehem and in her ninth month of pregnancy. At the time, she was warmly welcomed and cared for by the midwives at Holy Family Hospital.

Huang says "I gave birth to my daughter, Lee, on January 9, 2002, in a normal delivery. She weighed 3.91 kg. I felt completely safe in your hands. You were the protective hand and the hope that every mother need."

Now, many years later, she returned to offer her gratitude, not only in words, but through a meaningful act of giving. The group presented a

donation to the hospital's Charity Fund, in support of medical care for families in need.

# When Hope Comes to Your Doorstep

In the remote village of Al-Rashaydeh, where medical services are scarce and accessing healthcare during pregnancy is a real challenge, Aseel was preparing to welcome her first child filled with both excitement and worry.

But amid that distance and difficulty, a vital support was reaching her and other women across isolated communities, the Mobile Clinic of the Holy Family Hospital.

More than just a mobile clinic, it was a lifeline, offering Aseel consistent, high-quality prenatal care for nine months, a rare opportunity for women in her area.



On July 22, 2025, Aseel was admitted to the Holy Family Hospital, where she delivered her baby boy Ali, in a normal delivery weighing 3.235 kg.

She describes her experience as an emotional journey filled with contradictions fear and relief, tension and joy. But one thing was constant, the unwavering presence of the midwives and medical team, who guided her through each moment of labor and delivery.

Aseel says: It was my first birth, and I didn't know what to expect. But thanks to the midwives and the medical team, I never felt alone. The mobile clinic accompanied me throughout my pregnancy, and the hospital embraced me at the most critical moment. Their support is the reason I'm holding my baby in my arms today, safe and healthy. I'm truly grateful to the holy family hospital.



#### The Place We Never Hesitate to Return To



For Hala and her husband Yousef, the decision was never in question. Over the years, the Holy Family Hospital became more than just a medical institution, it became part of their family's story, a place they deeply trust with every new beginning.

During her fourth pregnancy, Hala continued her antenatal care through the Mobile Clinic, which reaches her area and provides essential care to women who otherwise lack easy access to medical services.

Hala shared with heartfelt sincerity "The Holy Family Hospital has always supported those less fortunate. It's known for helping people in need for

generations. And to us, the mobile clinics prove that mission is still alive today."

On July 22, 2025, Hala delivered her baby girl Rahaf, weighing 3.060 grams.

She describes the experience as profoundly emotional and filled with unwavering support from the medical team, it was a hard labor, but the team was incredibly supportive. Thanks to them, I was able to hold my baby girl in my arms. These moments are irreplaceable, and they are the reason I was able to live them.

Yousef echoed her feelings, describing the hospital as a place of comfort and certainty: This hospital has always been our first choice. I know my wife and baby are in safe hands, and that I'll get to hold my new-born, healthy and well. Every experience here is special, it truly feels like home.

In Hala's words, each birth I have had here has been unique, but one thing has always stayed the same is the sense of safety. The Holy Family Hospital gave me the chance to experience motherhood with love, care. I'm forever grateful.

# **Empowering our Mothers and Staff**

This month we've ended the third course of the hypnobirthing course for pregnant women, which was a part of our project funded by Manos Unidas.

On the final day of the course, a speacial session on breastfeeding was held for the pregnant women by our Breast feeding Consultant **Hiba Ayaseh** to make sure that our expectant mothers will not only be able to have a smooth delivery but also be able to provide their newborns with the best possible start in life through



proper nutrition and care. The session covered essential techniques, benefits of breastfeeding, and how to overcome common challenges, empowering the mothers with confidence and knowledge for a successful breastfeeding journey.



And our commitment to this wonderful approach does not stop here, we are thrilled to share that our staff (doctors, nurses and the other team members), has begun their own hypnobirthing

course. This is the fourth course offerd through the Manos Unidas project and the first dedicated to our own staff ensuring they have even deeper understanding of the techniques

our mother are learning about.
