Last year, I wrote, "If it thunders in August, great prosperity everywhere, but many sick people." It has thundered a lot since August 2025, but no prosperity.

A note of hope, however. More and more young people are getting married, a powerful testament to their hope for the future.

Let us pray, then, that Bethlehem and the Holy Land may find peace again and that our hospital, which remains a haven of peace and hope in this world gone mad, may for a long time to come offer the best to women and children in need.


Advancing our care




















Breastfeeding Week



Here at the Holy Family Hospital, we are deeply committed to the health of the families we serve. From the 1st to the 7th of August we were honored to celebrate the world

breastfeeding week with a series of special events designed to provide education, encouragement and community for new and expectant mothers. In a collaboration with the continuous education and committee of Bethlehem university, our team organized a comprehensive program that brought together our medical staff, student and most importantly our mothers in care.

This week was filled with valuable educational outreach, beginning with informational tour through our postpartum and pediatric unit, these sessions focused on the vital Importance of colostrum for baby's immunity and including



a one on one counseling to address individual questions and concerns. We also held a

scientific lecture for our nurses and midwives and health students on best practices. this provide a valuable platform for the mothers to share their experiences and discuss the challenges they face.



Our community engagement continued with awareness talks with the outpatient clients and a special round in the postpartum ward by our dedicated staff. The week culminated with a final inspiring lecture titled "breastfeeding is the right for every child", which brought mothers together for a meaningful discussion about giving their child the healthiest start in life.

The energy and sense of community throughout the week were truly inspiring. We believe that supporting a mother on her breastfeeding journey is a cornerstone of providing excellent postnatal care.

It was truly special to have midwifery students from Bethlehem university throughout the week, their energy was amazing. They brought so much heart to every event, we asked them to share what this experience meant to them and their words is just too beautiful not to share it:

From anxiety to hope


Two years ago, Jane and her husband, Elias, faced a difficult experience when their first


